REFERRAL PROCESS: PAEDIATRIC CLINICS

The clinical information provided in your referral will determine the triage category. The triage category will affect the timeframe in which the patient is offered an appointment.

Urgent (seen within 30 days of referral receipt)	Non-urgent
The patient has a condition that has the potential to deteriorate quickly with significant consequences for health and quality of life if not managed promptly. Examples include: • Neonatal screening abnormality – CF, CAH • Neonatal FTT • Neonatal murmur • Hypothyroidism • Unstable asthma, epilepsy, diabetes • Concerning lab results eg anaemia, severe hypothyroidism • Inguinal hernia • Referrals suggests that is the child is not reviewed within 30 days hospital admission due to acute deterioration is a high possibility • Antenatal paediatric referrals (complex care) • Healthy hearing referrals • Moderate functional impairment	The patient's condition is unlikely to deteriorate quickly or have significant consequences for the person's health and quality of life if specialist assessment is delayed beyond one month. Examples include: Hip reviews not requiring urgent attention Chronic skin conditions/allergies Growth and development Congenital abnormalities Uncomplicated umbilical hernia
