

Your important health information

Laser/LLETZ

You have had Laser/LLETZ treatment to remove pre-cancerous cells from the cervix.

A LLETZ involves taking a piece of tissue that is then examined by pathology.

A yellow coloured paste, called Monsel's solution may be applied to the treated area to reduce any initial bleeding. After a day or two this solution will be discharged form your vagina as grey-black coloured sediment.

You may have a blood-stained watery discharge for three to four weeks. Healing after Laser/LLETZ treatment is rapid but variable.

We strongly recommend that you take note of the following:

- If you experience bleeding heavier than your normal period and/or blood clots you should call the Gynaecological Oncology Unit from 8.30am to 5pm on 8458 4860, or after hours go to your nearest emergency department.
- Infections are uncommon, however, if your vaginal discharge is offensive, or you are experiencing fever or pelvic cramps, please call 8458 4860.
- Do not have sexual intercourse, use tampons or put creams into the vagina for at least four weeks.
- To reduce the risk of infection you are advised to avoid pools, spas and baths (showering is ok), vaginal sexual intercourse and using tampons until your vaginal bleeding has stopped.
- Do not engage in heavy exercise (that is aerobics, running, weights) for three days following the procedure.

Should you experience pain/discomfort

every four to six hours if you are uncomfortable.

You last had paracetamol at _____ am/pm.

Do not take any medications containing paracetamol until after _____ am/pm.

Do not take more than 8 tablets containing paracetamol in a 24 hour period.

Following the procedure you may have mild pain. You can take two tablets of paracetamol 500mg

If you are able to take anti-inflammatory medications, ibuprofen can also be taken if needed for pain relief. Take two tablets of 200mg ibuprofen, with food, up to three times a day when needed.

Do not take any more anti-inflammatory medications until after _____ am/pm on ___/__/__.



Stop taking anti-inflammatory medications if you are dehydrated, experience reflux or heartburn.

Some over-the-counter products contain paracetamol/ibuprofen in combination with other medications such as cold and flu tablets. Check with your doctor or pharmacist.

Do not take aspirin or aspirin containing medications (unless told to do so by your doctor).

In the 24 hours after surgery you must not:

- drive a motored vehicle
- go to work
- be the sole carer for another person
- drink alcohol
- make major decisions or sign legal documents
- operate machinery
- engage in sports.

You are required to have a responsible adult stay with you overnight.

In an emergency:

- call 000 for an ambulance
- go to your nearest emergency department.

Following Laser procedure

You will be required to have a follow-up cervical screen test in 12 months. This needs to be organised by your general practitioner (GP) or referring doctor.

Following LLETZ procedure

Your pathology results will be reviewed and you will be contacted with a management plan.
